


Making Our Democracy Work: A Judge's View

Stephen G. Breyer

Associate Justice of the US Supreme Court

Thursday, October 13, 2011

Charged with the responsibility of interpreting the Constitution, the nine unelected justices of the Supreme Court are empowered with the extraordinary authority to strike down laws enacted by our elected representatives. The Honorable Stephen Breyer, Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court since 1994, describes his approach toward the Court's mission as being pragmatic, applying unchanging constitutional values to ever-changing circumstances



Justice Breyer joins us to offer his thoughts on how the Supreme Court can promote workable government, without compromising constitutional principles, by respecting the roles that other actors — such as the president, Congress, administrative agencies, and the states — play in our democracy, and to discuss what the Court must do going forward to help make our democracy work and maintain the public's confidence.

**CHADWICK CONSTITUTIONAL
EDUCATION FELLOWSHIPS**

Applications are now being accepted for the two Chadwick Constitutional Education Fellowships. These \$1,750.00 fellowships were established to foster an understanding of the role of law, lawyers and the Constitution in American Society. Starting in November, fellowship recipients will spend 2-3 hours weekly meeting with students from Chester High School. Fellowship recipients will teach the students Constitutional Law and other legal principles. From January through April the fellowship recipients will spend 3-4 hours working on a moot court exercise with the Chester High School students. The fellowships will be awarded to the class of 2012 or 2013 students who, in the opinion of the selection committee, will be most likely to succeed in furthering the goals of the fellowships. Applicants should be in good academic standing and should have completed Constitutional Law, by December 2011. Experience teaching middle or high school students is a plus. The project will culminate in a performance of a moot court argument for the annual Delaware County Law Day Celebration in early May.

The purpose of the Roxana C. Arsht Fellowship is to encourage law students, recent law school graduates and attorneys newly admitted to the Bar of the Supreme Court of Delaware to pursue careers in non-profit sectors in Delaware. In an effort to encourage attorneys to work in public interest positions, the Fellowship offers financial assistance for three years to each recipient selected.

Applicants must apply for the Fellowship within three years of law school graduation, and must secure a position with a non-profit organization that provides legal services that benefit the Delaware community, underrepresented groups, or indigent persons in Delaware. An applicant's annual salary may not exceed \$50,000 to be eligible for the Fellowship.

For the year 2012, the Fellowship Committee will accept applications from September 1 through October 15, 2011. A decision will be announced by December 15, 2011 with one award being approved. The amount of the award will vary each year as it is based on the annual interest earned by the Fellowship Fund. Recipients will have two opportunities to pass the Delaware Bar exam, and if necessary, they must sit for the exam in consecutive years to continue their eligibility.

Widener School of Law Recycling Program is Single-Stream

(recyclables can be co-mingled in the blue containers on campus)

RECYCLING is the process of taking a product at the end of its useful life and using all or part of it to make another product. Recycling reduces waste sent to landfills, and making new products out of recycled ones reduces the amount of energy needed in production.

But it is not all about recycling. One of the easiest ways to be good to the environment is to **REDUCE**, or cut back, in key areas of your life. Three of the most important resources you can **reduce** are: energy, water, and solid waste.

REUSE is an important step after you've already **reduced**, but before you are ready to **recycle**. **Reuse** is simply the act of finding a second (or 3rd, or 10th or 100th) use for a product to prolong its life and it also reduces waste sent to landfills.




